

A Circle of Care

Sam's first encounter with Community Living Toronto—a United Way-funded agency that supports children, youth and adults who have an intellectual disability—was when he started volunteering for the agency while he was still in high school.

"I have always known about the agency because I'm someone with Autism Spectrum Disorder," he says.

Over the years, Sam has held a number of roles within the organization and is now a Public Relations and Fundraising Ambassador. The part Sam enjoys the most about his job is that it empowers him to share his story with businesses, donors and community members in order to increase people's awareness around people with different abilities.

"I am very capable of having meaningful conversations and have pretty good social skills because of my parents' support, I started absorbing what made me unique early on," says Sam.

After seeing Sam shine in his volunteer roles, Angela, a Director at Community Living Toronto offered Sam his current job.

"Sam has taught us a tremendous amount. One of the things we are advocating for all the time is amplifying people's voices by assisting them to tell their own stories as well as, being an example of the success in hiring people with different abilities. Having Sam as a co-worker makes our team so much stronger. His insights and contributions are crucial to advancing our work."

During the pandemic, Sam worked from home and connected with his team regularly.

"We are aware that if it wasn't for United Way, organizations like ours would not have been able to move quickly and respond to the changing needs that the pandemic presented," says Angela. "United Way was quick to hold out their hand to help. They started from a place of 'yes' and that makes Toronto a better place for everyone".

Inclusion Now Investments

United Way Centraide works locally to create opportunities so everyone can live a better life. United Way British Columbia School's Out Program

School's Out children take ownership of their personal health and fitness, improve their abilities to regulate their emotions and their likelihood of graduating from high school and increase opportunities to develop and apply new skills.


HIGHLIGHTS

80% increased their physical activity and gained knowledge about health and wellness.

79% established positive relationships with peers and program staff.

77% expanded their skills in either academics, sports, arts or other cultural domains.

4,164 newcomer children served

Newcomers

TORONTO

Rexdale Women's Centre

This centre supports refugee, immigrant and racialized women who are experiencing gender-based violence. It offers culturally and linguistically sensitive crisis services, supportive counselling and group intervention which enables women to give and receive support using a peer model. The program targets women experiencing or fleeing gender-based violence, as well as violence due to human trafficking, sexual assault and sexual abuse. Most of the service recipients are low income and experiencing significant barriers to accessing income supports.

HIGHLIGHTS

395 one-on-one assessments and referrals offered.

884 one-on-one supportive counselling sessions offered.

123 group sessions and workshops offered.

438 individuals served

MONTRÉAL

Network of Newcomer Welcome Centres

The goal of the network—consisting of **14** agencies—is to ensure that newcomer families successfully settle and begin to integrate into their new community by providing education and support with the settlement process and building community networks.

HIGHLIGHTS

CANA (Carrefour d'Aide aux Nouveaux arrivants) helped **911** newcomers through **1,278** interventions, mostly related to work permits, citizenship, renewal of permanent resident status and family allowances.

CARI St-Laurent helped **615** asylum seekers through **1,776** individual interventions and organized two customized information sessions as they do not meet the eligibility criteria for governmental programs.

SIARI (Service d'interprète d'aide de référence aux immigrants) supported **680** people and helped understand information related to COVID-19 and get emergency food access.

United Way British Columbia School's Out Program

School's Out program ensures vulnerable school-aged Indigenous youth have access to safe spaces where they can get the mental wellness and developmental support they need.

HIGHLIGHTS

78% developed stronger self awareness, social awareness and relationship skills.

77% felt motivated to meaningfully contribute to their community.

CALGARY

Diamond Willow Youth Lodge

Diamond Willow Lodge is a youth-inspired and led gathering space for Indigenous youth. In this community setting, youth can hang out, connect with their culture, participate in a variety of programs, and learn about the various services available to them throughout Calgary and area.



Diamond Willow Youth Lodge is intended to be a zero-barrier, safe space welcoming youth to stop in for a warm beverage and easy conversation. Led by Indigenous youth coordinators, an Indigenous Youth Council and youth participants with diverse Indigenous backgrounds, the Lodge provides culturally appropriate healing practices and activities, as well as access to a variety of supports.

HIGHLIGHTS

Collaborative relationships built with **50** local organizations and artists.

183 youth were connected to other supports.

On average, individual youth accessed Diamond Willow Youth Lodge **5.45** times annually.

598 youth served

“ Gratitude Group has given me something to look forward to during the week, reminds me of all the good things that surround me in life, and allowed me to trust others with my love and trusting others’ love.

The Group has helped me along my path of healing. Gratitude has helped me with daily practices of appreciating the things that I DO have and not taking them for granted. Allowing me to even like things about myself which is normally quite a struggle. It is so easy to focus on the negative in day-to-day life and the Group gives me the opportunity to let all of that go.

Whenever I think of the Group it is just a wave of emotions that puts me at peace and gives me a sense of calm, happiness, and appreciation. It is hard just to pick one moment because every second makes the whole experience beautiful, although I am particularly fond of when we all just start laughing over something silly and it feels like the whole world and its worries fade away and the only thing left is this singular moment in time where I don’t have to be perfect for anyone, I can just be myself, happy. **”**

Native Canadian Centre of Toronto

Eshkiniigjik Naandwechigegamig—A Place for Healing for Our Families is an Indigenous mental health and addictions case management, referral and assessment service provided within the traditional Indigenous cultural matrix of healing, including artistic expression, language, support circles, Elder knowledge and an outdoor cultural program.

HIGHLIGHTS

The program pivoted to Zoom and phone meetings in order to continue to provide service to its clients. Case managers met their clients outside NCCT when public health guidelines allowed them to do so.

Case managers checked in with all their clients through email, Zoom, text and phone to ensure their needs were met and they had access to the support and services they need.

The 519 Church Street Community Centre's Early Learning and Community Program

The 519's Early Learning and Community Program is a supportive space for families of diverse identities and configurations and their children (age 0 to 6) to meet, play, talk, learn and grow with each other. The program provides early learning activities, music and movement, creative experiences, nutritious snacks and parent education.

HIGHLIGHTS

126 virtual sessions focused on parent support and child development were delivered over the year with an average of **2** virtual sessions per week.



An average of **27.5 hours** of in-person programming per week took place over the year.




Barbra Schlifer Commemorative Clinic

The Clinic serves single-parent, immigrant and refugee women with mental health challenges as a result of unresolved violence, with complex intersecting legal issues in family, immigration and criminal law. The Clinic provides legal advice and representation to high-need clients who are living in poverty but do not qualify for legal aid because of family assets or legal issues. **80%** of the Clinic's clients are victims of domestic violence seeking assistance in family law.

HIGHLIGHTS

Provided assistance to clients applying for Legal Aid certificates on a daily basis.



Summary legal advice meetings for family, immigration and or sexual assault clients were provided between **15 to 18** times per week.


Client work related to representation on family or immigration applications was scheduled by three staff lawyers **3 to 4** days a week.

Public Legal Education presentations were given on average twice per month.

Women

MONTRÉAL



Network of Women's Centres throughout Greater Montréal

Centraide of Greater Montréal invests in **28** agencies that provide vulnerable women crucial support in various aspects of their lives. These women's centres offer a wide range of services that are specifically adapted to women's needs and to experience. They also work with the community to develop anti-discrimination initiatives. Some of the services offered include discussion and support groups and workshops on topics like housing, violence, immigration and sexual assault. Outside of the women's centre network, Centraide of Greater Montréal provides supports to women who are seniors, newcomers, immigrants, have a disability, young mothers and women who experience intimate partner violence.

HIGHLIGHTS

112 young mothers in the South Shore neighbourhood were supported by one of our centres.

In a Montréal shelter dedicated to women experiencing homelessness, **225** women between the ages of **18** and **30** were supported (including 13 trans women).

QUÉBEC CITY



Collective Impact Network of Women's Services in the Greater Québec City region

The **41** community organizations in this network offer a wide range of activities and support for women, including housing, shelter, health and psychological services for families to provide parenting support. This network aims to tackle social isolation and meet basic needs.

HIGHLIGHTS

An increased number of women experienced intimate partner violence during the pandemic. The network of agencies supported women through information sharing and providing support over the phone, helping **468** women.



The number of young women struggling with eating disorders rose during the pandemic. The program provided support to **694** teenagers and their families.

United Way British Columbia School's Out Programs

School's Out programs provide educational support and homework assistance, physical activity and development, mentoring, social and emotional support.

HIGHLIGHTS

79% of participants established positive relationships with peers and program staff.

78% developed stronger self awareness, social awareness and relationship skills.

100 individuals living with disabilities served

TORONTO

Community Living Toronto

The Bridging Diversity and Inclusion program increases understanding and improves access to services for individuals with an intellectual disability who are LGBTQ2S+ and/or newcomers to Canada. The program aims to promote safety, belonging, and social opportunities for LGBTQ2S+ youth and adults with intellectual disabilities, and increase service and community participation for racialized newcomer families who have children with intellectual disabilities.



HIGHLIGHTS

Education and liaison work included virtual support groups for caregivers **once a week**

CLTO Influencers—an awareness and advocacy initiative co-designed with people with an intellectual disability—met **weekly** to discuss content creation and social media posts

Anti-Racism EDI Committee met **bi-weekly** to celebrate provincial, national and international cultural and heritage months along with international recognition days.

VANCOUVER

McCarthy Tétrault ran a very engaging workplace campaign in 2021 using a primarily virtual format. Highlights include a campaign kick-off event featuring a United Way speaker, and a series of 'Partners Dinners' where Firm members purchased tickets to attend a dinner hosted in-person by Firm partners. Their wrap up event also featured an opportunity to learn more about United Way's local Food Hubs and how campaign donations support increased food security for the community.

McCarthy Tétrault staff heard from powerful impact speakers on behalf of the Youth Futures Education Fund, as well as the Food Security Initiative. Overall, the Vancouver office saw an increase in participation of roughly **140%** in 2021 and stable donations as against 2020.

With TD, McCarthy Tétrault co-hosted a professional development event to drive awareness of the roots of poverty and inequities in the GTA, and to mobilize legal professionals to help their communities become more inclusive and equitable. The session was attended by over 50 lawyers and qualified for Law Society of Ontario CPD accreditation.

McCarthy Tétrault was recognized as a top supporter on our annual Local Leaders List, featured in an ad in the Globe and Mail as well as on our website. **McCarthy Tétrault was the only law firm recognized in the \$1M+ category.**

At the campaign kick-off panel, Dave Leonard was joined by Daniele Zanotti, President and CEO of United Way Greater Toronto, Norie Campbell (TD) and Maura Lawless (The 519). Panelists discussed the impact of the pandemic on marginalized communities and the role of corporate and community leadership and collaboration in fueling an equitable recovery.
