## A NEW BEGINNING

THANKS TO MCCARTHY TÉTRAULT'S SUPPORT, LYLA WAS ABLE TO CONNECT WITH HER INDIGENOUS ROOTS

**66** *I* want to be that same important person for someone else's journey." "I lost my father at a young age. He was my primary caregiver and one of my only connections to my native heritage. I started using drugs and alcohol to cope.

I entered rehab after dropping out of school in Grade 9. When I got out, I went right back to doing drugs and drinking—the same lifestyle I had before.

It was my mom who got me into the rehab program that finally made a difference. It was my third attempt at rehab, and it worked. When I was finishing that program, I came across a posting for a job at a United Way-supported social enterprise. It's a place that helps connect Indigenous youth with on-the-job skills training and experience that prepares them for the labour market. I applied for the job, and I got an interview at the agency. I instantly felt connected and supported.

I was so happy when I got the job. I got to sell First Nations, Métis and Inuit handcrafts and art. Life was still really hard—at points I was even suicidal— but somehow I still made it to work every morning.

My job was the one thing that really helped me. It gave me a reason to wake up every day. It gave me a purpose. It also taught me important skills like handling finances, public speaking and how to run an e-commerce site. I also had the chance to connect with some of the agency's young people and to see their struggles. Every sale I made felt so meaningful because I got to see the difference that money was making in the lives of these youth.

Today, I know exactly what I want to do. I want to help people, whether that means being a child and youth worker, a social worker, or a therapist. I want to be that same important person for someone else's journey. Because I've been through so much, I think I'm the perfect person to help others."

The partnership between McCarthy Tétrault and United Way Centraide is the perfect opportunity to lay the groundwork for an inclusive society. We share McCarthy Tétrault's commitment to deepening our engagement and service to local communities, informed by an equity lens that helps empower groups that are the most marginalized.

The United Way Centraide network represents the most comprehensive array of social service investing in Canada, covering 90 per cent of Canada's population and including more than 3,000 agency partners and 6,000 programs. Through deep-rooted relationships and research, United Way Centraide understands the pressing local issues facing neighbourhoods and communities across the country. We engage individuals, community service organizations and corporate, education and labour partners in finding community-based solutions to complex, #UNIGNORABLE issues across Canada.

Today, United Way Centraide continues to invest millions of dollars across Canada to help build inclusive cities and communities. Examples of this type of work include:

- Ethno-specific crisis intervention and individual counselling for **newcomers** to Canada.
- Putting **Indigenous** youth and adults on pathways to sustainable employment through education and employment readiness programs.
- Counselling and mental health supports for vulnerable members of **LGBTQ2S** communities, including one-on-one counselling to address trauma.
- Putting **youth and adults with disabilities** on pathways to living independently, through life skills training and education and employment readiness programs.
- Programs to help **women and their children** flee violence and secure a safe living environment.

#### Diamond Willow Youth Lodge

Opened in the fall of 2018, the Diamond Willow Youth Lodge engages urban Indigenous youth on a path of healing and wellbeing to address the impacts of intergenerational trauma and promote truth and reconciliation. Youth-led and youth-driven culture is embedded into the Lodge, empowering youth voices to be heard, and helping create a space for which they feel a sense of pride and ownership. By providing culturally-appropriate healing practices and activities, the Lodge promotes self-discovery, Indigenous identity, and well-being.

#### Toronto

#### Native Canadian Centre of Toronto: Eshkiniigjik Naandwechigegamig — A Place for Healing Our Families

The program is provided in partnership with Parkdale Queen West Community Health Centre, which provides priority access for participants with mental health and addictions requiring primary care and psychiatric consultation. Culturally-based group programming includes life skills, recovery, resiliency, artistic expression, language, support circles, and outdoor education.

281	adults aged 25-64 received services
2	additional social workers hired, thanks to new funding
1,311	face-to-face contacts/telephone visits
29	group sessions completed to provide culturally- appropriate, peer-based group programming to support the cultural interventions required for successful healing

#### Montréal

Welcoming newcomers to Greater Montréal and helping them integrate

Centraide invests more than \$1 million annually to reach more than 55,000 families of newcomers. This work is achieved by 10 agencies whose mission is directly related to welcoming newcomers and helping them integrate into their new communities, and by a network of 70 agencies that offer a range of complementary services. In short, these agencies offer immigrants all manner of support to help them successfully settle into their new community.

#### Rexdale Women's Centre

The agency provides settlement supports, employment and personal counselling, life skills training, health workshops, English as a Second Language instruction, information and referral, community outreach, child minding, crisis intervention and violence prevention supports, and parenting programs.

Annually this initiative supports:

421 immigrant, refugee and/or racialized women experiencing gender-based violence
64 women found employment or re-entered the workforce
7 women pursued training and further education

#### Toronto

The 519 Church Street Community Centre: Early Learning and Parenting Program

Provides a welcoming, safe and inclusive space for members of LGBTQ2S families to be their authentic selves as they take part in arts, recreational and educational programming. The program offers queer and trans parenting courses that explore practical, emotional, social, financial, medical and legal issues related to becoming a parent. Sixteen hundred parents and children are served each year.

- **1,952** individuals participated in an early learning and parenting program
- 841 individuals received counselling support

#### Barbra Schlifer Commemorative Clinic

The clinic provides access to effective and integrated professional justice and community services for women to whom accessibility is most often denied. The objectives of the program include training students, and thereby building a better response to the issues of violence against women and improving the legal narrative that informs these judgements.

#### Women United

Women United is a group of like-minded members who have the talent, expertise and networks necessary to make a real difference in the lives of women and their families experiencing poverty. In 2018, working closely with United Way, these women raised more than \$1.5 million to support 17 programs across Peel, Toronto and York Region.

Women United is a diverse community of change-makers, bound together by our desire to help transform the lives of women and their families. ### Montréal

#### Network of women's centres throughout Greater Montréal

Centraide invests more than \$2 million annually in 20 women's shelters within the Greater Montréal Region. This investment helps to reach close to 70,000 women and their loved ones each year. These agencies specifically aim to support vulnerable women in various aspects of their lives, with the goal of improving their living conditions, breaking their social isolation and promoting their autonomy.

- **2,282** women and their loved ones were assisted through programs, education and advocacy efforts
- **75%** of the women who participated in art therapy sessions reported reduced stress and less anxiety



#### Québec City

#### 33 organizations are providing services for women

Centraide supports community residential facilities that provide women's services, services for women affected by sexual violence, and housing for families where women can go with their spouse for a more effective division of parental responsibilities. Certain organizations, such as women's centres, provide services directly to women and help them feel less isolated.


## **RECOGNIZING YOU**
